The guidelines

The consistent and correct application of the visual identity is required in order to present a strong and coherent branded image. This will reinforce the core values of WorldSkills and ensure awareness and recognition of the organisation.

By following these guidelines we will ensure that a consistent image for WorldSkills is employed throughout all applications.


1.1 What's new in these guidelines?

Encourage wider use of the WorldSkills logo

The WorldSkills logo was designed by Teaho Yang, a graphic design student at Mokwon University in Korea. His design was chosen by the WorldSkills General Assembly in June 2000 from the entries received from a global student design competition.

The design shows a hand, as expressed by five strong lines of colour representing the youth of all countries, reaching out for new skills.

The logotype has been designed to complement the symbol and is based on the competition finalist design from Kathrin Baldo and Andreas Alber of South Tyrol, Italy.





1.2 What's new in these guidelines?

Encourage wider use of the WorldSkills hand symbol

The WorldSkills symbol is unique, colourful, and bold. It has powerful, positive attributes.

Whilst the original idea was to reserve the hand symbol for the international organisation, it is now considered more advantageous to encourage member countries to use it and other WorldSkills identity elements.

This will build local and international brand recognition across all levels of activity.







1.3 What's new in these guidelines?

Omit IVTO positioning statement

It is considered that the WorldSkills identity now has sufficient recognition, maturity and strength to drop the IVTO positioning statement.

This will simplify the message and create a more 'immediate' identity.

This change will affect the visual expression only, **not** the title of the legal entity.

1.4 What's new in these guidelines?

Omit the horizontal version of the logo

In the interests of simplification, the horizontal version of the logo will be omitted from the guidelines in favour of the more dynamic 'stacked' version.

1.6 What's new in these guidelines?

New typographic standards

The omission the IVTO positioning statement has allowed a review of the typographic style. The new design is more direct, dynamic and modern than the original design, which was constrained by the IVTO positioning statement.

The new typographic standards give greater prominence to the secondary messages, thereby encouraging greater acceptance and use. They are easier to communicate and adopt and present a more modern visual approach.



WorldSkills expressed in typed text

2.1 WorldSkills expressed in typed text

The correct way to type WorldSkills in any text (in all applications), is as one word in lower case with an upper case W and S.

The only exception to this is in the expression of the WorldSkills world wide web address, which is all in lower case: www.worldskills.org

The correct WorldSkills configuration when typing WorldSkills: World Skills X These are all incorrect Never insert a word break. configurations when typing WorldSkills: Worldskills Always use an upper case W and S. Section 3

3.1 Configuration and clear space

Logo configuration

There is only one configuration of the logo: where the hand symbol sits over the logotype.

This logo is also available in a simplified form to be used when size or reproduction limitations may compromise clarity.

Do not use any other configurations of logotype and hand symbol.

Clear space

The WorldSkills logo should always be placed clear from other graphic elements. Use the x height as a guide when positioning the logo. No other graphic material should be closer than the x height.



3.2 WorldSkills colour logos

There are a number of formats in which the logo has been produced. Use the logo file type which best suits your application.

3.6 Simplified Logo

Simplified Logo

This version of the logo has been redrawn for applications where the reproduction quality is limited, such as embroidery. It is supplied in black only. If colour is to be used, WorldSkills main colour palette colours should be specified and colour breakdowns supplied.

Activity statements

Section

4.1 Activity statements

The WorldSkills movement encompasses many bodies and activities including the international organisation, the WorldSkills Competition, national member organisations and various other programs.

The WorldSkills visual identity treats all these activity statements in a similar style, following common guidelines.

The guidelines have been designed to make simple the creation of the visual representation of these activities, thereby encouraging greater use and wider recognition.

4.2 Activity statements

The logos for activity statements can be created from a single, common artwork file, shown here.

The typography used for the activity statement matches the type size and weight of 'world' from the WorldSkills logo.

The artwork file allows each activity statement to be typed over the template to create each new logo.

If required, secondary messages can added in the same way.

The artwork is supplied in EPS format and the Frutiger font is required. While both are readily available, professional help should be sought in the creation of logos and identity systems.

4.3 WorldSkills international statement

The WorldSkills international statement denotes the international organisation when it appears on the same page or document as the member organisation. This ensures differentiation between a member organisation and the international organisation.

4.4 WorldSkills member statement logo

The WorldSkills member statement logo allows member organisations to show their affiliation to the WorldSkills movement. It must be used with the international statement.







4.5 WorldSkills member statement wordmark

To show membership to WorldSkills without showing the full WorldSkills logo as per 4.4, use the member statement wordmark.

The correct way to type 'A Member of WorldSkills International' in any text or font is shown on the right.



WorldSkills background pattern

Section 5

5.1 WorldSkills background pattern

The WorldSkills background pattern has been designed to complement the WorldSkills logo.

The WorldSkills background pattern is available in two colour options as shown on your right. It has vibrancy when used in WorldSkills blue or subtlety when used in the WorldSkills grey.

The background pattern can be used in print and electronic media, on stationery, banners, advertising and other communications material.

6.1 Colour palette

The WorldSkills visual identity elements have been created in CMYK process, RGB (web safe colours) and Pantone® colour systems. Precise reproduction of these colours is required to maintain a coherent branded image.

Typography

Section 4

7.1 Typography

The primary typeface for WorldSkills is Frutiger, a modern sans serif font which complements the WorldSkills logotype. All body copy should be set in Frutiger Light or Roman; headings and text requiring greater prominence can be set in Bold.

Other fonts which are acceptable substitutes for Frutiger are:

- (on a PC) Arial
- (on a Mac®) Helvetica.

These fonts are only to be used in circumstances where Frutiger is not available, for example, in word processing and common desktop applications only. Arial or Helvetica should not be used on any printed material.

HTML text should be set in Arial/Helvetica only.

8.1 Applying the identity

The WorldSkills ceremonial flag

This flag is to be flown at official WorldSkills events, and within venues during the WorldSkills Competitions.

This flag has been constructed using the WorldSkills logo from the Pantone Matching System. The background should always be white.

8.2 Applying the identity

The WorldSkills decorative flag

This flag can be flown at informal WorldSkills events and outside venues at WorldSkills Competitions.





This flag has been constructed using the background pattern in WorldSkills blue and WorldSkills cyan (WS_BG_BLU.eps) and a WorldSkills activity statement logo in white.





This flag has been constructed using the background pattern in WorldSkills grey (WS_BG_GRY.eps) and the WorldSkills logo from the Pantone Matching System (WS_PMS.eps).

8.3 Applying the identity

The WorldSkills banner

This banner can be flown at informal WorldSkills events and outside venues at WorldSkills Competitions.

This banner has been constructed using the background pattern in WorldSkills blue and WorldSkills cyan (WS_BG_BLU.eps) and a WorldSkills activity statement logo in white.







8.4 Applying the identity

WorldSkills letterhead

Shown here is the WorldSkills letterhead in full colour.


This letterhead has been constructed using the background pattern in WorldSkills grey, the WorldSkills logo from the Pantone Matching System and the text in black.

8.5 Applying the identity

WorldSkills business card

Shown here is the WorldSkills business card in full colour. It has an optional design which can be printed on the back of the card.

This business card has been constructed using the background pattern in WorldSkills grey, the WorldSkills logo from the Pantone Matching System and the text in black.

8.6 Applying the identity

WorldSkills folder

This folder design is included in the digital artwork files. When assembled, the folder will accommodate A4 pages and has a capacity of approximately 7mm.



Use glue or double-sided tape on this flap to form a pocket.






WSFLDR_BLU.eps This folder has been constructed using the background pattern in WorldSkills blue and WorldSkills cyan and the WorldSkills logo in white. A special knife should be made to die-cut and crease the printed sheets to the correct shape. The knife dieline artwork is included in the file. An overall matt celloglaze, laminate or varnish should be applied to protect the paper stock. Paper stock should be white coated board of approximately 300gsm.

8.7 Applying the identity

The WorldSkills sample medal

The medal design uses the WorldSkills logo embossed over the WorldSkills background pattern.





The reverse side of the medal should be an individual design to commemorate both the year and host nation of the competition.

8.8 Applying the identity


Event logos

Additional elements may be added to the WorldSkills logo when used for competition events or promotion. Pictorial images may be used (flags or iconic images to represent a country or event). The WorldSkills logo should never be edited or compromised by any other part of the design.

The design of event logos conforms to the guidelines for constructing any other activity statement.
