The city of Melbourne

Location for the Assembly

We have chosen Melbourne because it offers the General Assembly a rare opportunity.

Australia's National Competition Finals and the General Assembly hotels and meeting rooms are within a few minutes walk of each other - yet still positioned in the most perfect location in the guiet heart of this very pretty city, on the River Yarra.

The General Assembly Meeting
